Title: "Room for Hope" - Sanctuary Advent Series, wk 4

Theme: Hope is about leaving room for God to do SOMETHING, even if it's not

THE THING we imagined.

## 1

Hope is an essential theme of Christmas

Hope is what brings the shepherds out of the fields and leads them to the manger

Hope is what prompts the magi to make a trip across the desert in search of a king

And hope is the thing that causes Joseph not to abandon Mary, even when his life stops making sense

Hope is important to biblical faith But it often gets a bad rap

We will say things like "hope is not a strategy"
Dismissively
As though hope doesn't matter
Like it's the same as believing in fairy dust or magic potions

But in the same way hope isn't a strategy I can also 100% guarantee this: neither is despair

Hope will at least get you out of bed to *plan* your strategy
Despair pulls the covers back over your head
If you've spent any time at that level of hopelessness, you don't
ever want to go back there

Hope matters because it OPENS UP possibilities Where despair SHUTS THEM DOWN

Joseph had a choice to make upon hearing some unexpected news about his soon-to-be bride

He faced a choice between hope and despair

We're told that he learns of the pregnancy *before* the visit from the angel

How he finds out, we're not sure – from Mary or someone else

But either way, at the moment of the angel's visit –

he's contemplating the fact that his fiancé is pregnant, but not with his baby

And he's deep in thought on a question that must have seemed momentous to him

To go through with the wedding or to tear up the marriage contract

We read that Joseph is "righteous" – which can go either way in a decision like this one

Some people we might describe with that word "righteous"

Well, it's not hard to imagine them jumping immediately to public humiliation –

They might immediately make Mary's infidelity known In order to preserve their own dignity

We've probably all known enough nasty church people that we can easily imagine it

But Joseph was a DIFFERENT kind of righteous
The humble kind who believed in a God who is still in the
business of doing amazing and miraculous things

So even if Joseph couldn't quite wrap his head around what the angel was telling him,

he wasn't prepared to rule out the possibility That God was up to something here

Joseph, the scripture says, woke from his dream and immediately acted

He didn't hesitate, but did just as the angel commanded

Not unlike Mary's response that said, "Let it be with me according to your Word,"

Joseph also accepts his role in God's plan without reservation and without hesitation

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We may have a hard time imagining ourselves inside the Holy Family's situation

What we would do if angels told us that something big was happening

And God needed us to be part of it

But here's the thing: Something big IS happening And God DOES need you to be part of it Do you believe that?

Because as long as we are on this side of heaven There is a gap between what is and what should be

And in that gap, there's a whole lot of human suffering:
Children being abused and neglected
Young people dying from addiction
Families living in their cars
Older adults choosing between food and their medications

And the distance between what is and what should be is the place where Christ calls us to get to work

It's the place where he himself was at work

Healing the sick

And feeding the hungry

And reminding people that God doesn't give up on us

Whenever we see people *falling* into the gap Jesus *calls* us into the gap Because God needs us there

Joseph found himself in that place
Between what was and what should be
And as he thought more and more, he realized there was only
one way out: to let Mary go
The only question was: whether to do it quietly or publicly?

But the encounter with the angel opened up another possibility entirely – that this wasn't a "problem" but rather a "plan" Joseph's dream revealed God at work in an entirely unexpected way

Have you ever had that experience of a surprising solution? One you never saw coming?

It's easy, in the midst of hardship
To run out of hope
Which is often the same as running out of imagination
We get stuck
So we embrace a solution like Joseph did – cut your losses

Or maybe in *more* hopeful moments, we can imagine *one* or *two* possibilities –

but they seem like they would require miracles So it just feels ridiculous to even pray for them

In those moments, it's important to hold on to hope
To remember what Paul said in Romans 5:5 – that "hope does not disappoint us"

Hope does NOT disappoint us It's not the fragile, weak thing we often imagine it to be In fact, it's the thing that keeps us moving forward

The great thing about hope is that
Even when we can only see ONE possibility
And it seems so farfetched that it's ridiculous
Hope doesn't require us to believe that God will do THE thing
It just requires us to trust that God will do SOMETHING

Because God isn't confined to the miracle we're praying for God doesn't need to do the thing we expect God is free to move in an entirely different direction – in ways we haven't even imagined yet Hope is about us giving God room to work

And when we trust God to move, then we can too We can trust that God *will* work it out Even if we don't yet know *how* God's going to work it out

I know, hope is not a strategy But I'm telling you: neither is despair In the gap between what is and what should be
In that space, we will find all kinds of human suffering
That's the place where Jesus calls us – where big things are
happening

Where God is changing things for the better

And you can't go in there without making room for hope Not in naïve way, not in a clueless way

Not in a way that has no plan

But in a way that admits of possibilities that we have not yet imagined

God doesn't have to do THE thing that's in your mind God just needs to do SOMETHING!

What if that situation you've been stuck in Is STUCK precisely because you haven't actually given God any room to move?

I want you to ponder that this week

Instead of giving up, Instead of pulling back in despair What if you lean even more firmly into the promise of hope?

Hope is about making room for God to do SOMETHING Even if it's not THE THING you imagined
